Criteria:

- Rising juniors or seniors majoring in journalism, public relations or marketing
- Must attend a university or college in the Nashville area or in southern Kentucky
- A grade point average of at least 2.5 is required. Extracurricular activities will be considered.
- Complete an application form, write a 500-words essay on why you chose to study communications and how your plan to use your degree, and provide a transcript.
- Submit a letter of recommendation from a faculty member and samples of your journalistic work
- Must be a full-time student and will be required to provide receipts showing purchases of books or technology.

Deadline: The application form, essay and transcript are due Friday, Nov. 29, 2013. They can be submitted by mail through the organization's address above or sent via email to nashvillenabj@gmail.com.

Notification: Recipients will be notified by Tuesday, Dec. 31.
